Passes & Permits

A llvehicles entering Colorado State Parks are required to display a Daily or Annual State Parks Vehicle Passon the windshield. A Camping Permit and a Vehicle Passare required for cam ping. Daily Passes and Cam p Perm its can be purchased at the Entrance Station, self-serve stations or the Visitor Center. Annual Park Passes and discounted Aspen LeafAnnual Passes (for Colorado residents 64 years and older) are also available.

Camping

Vega State Park provides visitors with several cam ping options. Most cam psites are within easy walking distance of the shoreline. Early Settlers C am pground offers 34 pullthrough and back-in cam psites, with electrical and water hookups, flush toilets and coin-operated showers. A spen Grove Campground has 28 pull-through and back-in sites with centrally boated waterpum ps and vault to ilets. Oak PointCam pground provides 37 pull-through and back in sites with centrally located waterpum ps and vault toilets. For am ore unique experience, Pioneer Cam pground offers 10 walk-in tent sites and five rustic cabins, with centrally located waterpum psand vault toilets. Cam pgrounds are open during the spring, sum m er and fallm on ths. An RV dum p station is boated near Early Settlers C an pyround, just north of the VisitorCenter.Cabins are available year round.To reserve a cam psite or a cabin, call 1-800-678-2267 if outside the Denverarea, or 303-470-1144 in the Denverarea, or visit Vega on the web at www.cpw.state.co.us

Corrals & Pets

Horse cornals are adjacent to the cabins on U SFS Road #262 that leads to the G rand M esa N ational Forest. C orrals can be reserved by calling the Visitor Center (970)487-3407. Additional fees apply for use of the corrals and bringing a pet to the cabins. There are no fees for pets at the cam psizes but please keep them attended, under control, on a six foot leash and be sure to clean up their waste.

Picnicking

Vega offers several quiet day-use picnic areas overboking the lake. Located adjacent to A spen G rove can percound, the covered M eadow sG roup Picnic A rea provides a beautiful setting for fam ily reunions, weddings and other events. This handicap accessible area will accomm odate 100 people and includes: a huge BBQ grill, serving tables, water, electricity, pionic tables, and a large grass field for sport activities. To reserve up to one year in advance, call the V isitor C enter at (970)487-3407.

Fishing & Hunting

Vegastwo-m ile bng reservoir is the largest body of water in the Grand Valley. A Colorado Fishing License is required

for everyone 16 years and older and can be purchased at the Visitor Center. Many people catch their 4-fish lim it of Rainbow, Cutthroat, or Cutbow Trout. O ak Pointday use area hasa handicap accessible fishing dock. Hunting is perm itted in the park during established seasons from the first Tuesday after Labor D ay to the Friday before M em orial Day. A rchery or shotgun baded with birdshot is permitted. M any huntersw ill cam p in the park and hunt the nearby Grand Mesa National Forest. Colorado hunting statutes and requiations apply.

W ildlife

Easily observable wildlife include: m arm ots, m ule deer, chipm unks, weasels, porcupines, and foxes. Rarer sightings include:black bear, beavers, elk and m cose. 0 ver 100 species of birds share Vegas habitat including waterfow 1, ospreys,

hawks, hummingbirds, bluebirds, blue grouse, and wild turkeys. Educational hikes and program sare offered during the sum m er and throughout the year by calling in advance.

M otorized Recreation

The OHV /snowm obile staging area is boated in the southwest corner of

the park. It provides parking with easy access to the G rand Mesa National Forest via US Forest Service Road 262 (Park Creek Road). A lthough snowm obile operation is permitted in most areas of the park, the operation of four-wheelers (OHV) is not permitted. Only can persat Early Settlers and Pioneer cabin areas are allowed to drive their OHV from their site to USFS Road 262.0 ther cam percound users are required to trailer their OHV s to the staging area. OHV s and snowm obilesm ust have a current registration and tow vehicles are required to have a state parks pass while using the staging area.

Boating & Water Sports

Vegasvastreservoiroffersopportunities forsailing, canoeing, water-skiing, and jet-skiing. Sw in m ing is not permitted. Boat ram psare available at day use areas boated near Early Settlers, 0 ak Point and Island cam percunds.M otorboats and sailboats m ust be registered and inspected for Aquatic Nuisance Species at the Entrance Station or Visitor Centerbefore launching. Colorado boating statutes and regulations apply.

W interRecreation

Com e and en py VegasW interW onderland! Vega offers som e of the best areas for ice-fishing, cross-country skiing, snow shoeing, and snowm obiling. The rustic cabins can be reserved year-round and are located near U SFS Road 262 with access to the Grand Mesa National Forest.

Non-Park A crom odations

A restaurant is located adjacent to the park. Com m ercial, religious, and m edical facilities can be found in Collbran 12 m ileswestofthepark.

All-terrain W heelchairs

Vega has two all-ternain, non electric, wheel chairs, free of charge for anyone needing help with access to trails or the shoreline. Please inquire at the Visitors Center form ore information.










COLORADO PARKS & W ILDLIFE









igh above the littlem ountain town of Colloran lies Vega State Park, with 1,830 acresofscenicm ountain splendornestled on the northern edge of the Grand M esa. The parksnam e comes from the Spanish word for 'M eadow s?' V isitors enjoy the vibrantm ontanem eadow sof wildflow ers, aspen-covered hillsides, deer, foxes, bluebirds and m ore.

A t8000 feet in elevation, Vega Reærvoir and itsm eadow sare rich in history and natural beauty. The U te Indians inhabited this region prior to the 1776 visit from Spanish explorers, D om inguez and Escalante. In the 1880 s, early Plateau Valley settlers constructed houses and a cem etery in the area now known as Vega State Park.

By 1957, construction of the dam began .W ith completion of Vega dam in 1962, a 900-acre reservoir was form ed. In 1959, Vega State Park was established in partnership with the Colorado D ivision of Parks and O utdoor Recreation and the U S.Bureau of Reclam ation.

A lihough the prim ary goal of the reservoir is to supply inrigation water to ranchers and farm ens, Vega quickly becam e a great cam ping, boating and fishing destination. Snowm obiling, ice-fishing, and rustic cabins also make Vega a well-known winter sports area. With easy access to the G rand M esa N ational Forest, m any cam pers and hunters travelby four-wheelers, horseback, or snowm obile to m ore than 300 m iles of trails south of Vega.
